In addition to the musical and dance performances, the festival brings a wide variety of exhibitors, workshops, plays and demonstrations. Scottish clans and Irish families will feature demonstrations and explanations as to the strong connection between the various Celtic groups in their music, ancestry and culture. Various Welsh, Cornish and Breton organizations will bring with them their rich yet varied cultures. Until the expansions of the Roman Republic and Germanic tribes, much of Europe was predominantly Celtic. This region is sometimes referred to as the "Celtic Crescent" because of the near crescent shaped position of the nations in Europe.

The festival will run from 10:30 am to 9:00 pm on Saturday, October 2nd and from 11:30 am to 7:30 pm on Sunday, October 3rd in the Will Rogers Memorial Center, Fort Worth, Texas.
